Their clients include architects, planners, developers, local authorities, semi-state bodies and government departments.</p> <p>The archaeological excavation on this site took place between 13 September 1999 and 09 May 2000. The excavation was carried out under licence to Duchas The Heritage Service and The National Museum of Ireland. Fieldwork and report production were undertaken by Irish Archaeological Consultancy Ltd. for Dublin Corporation, who initiated and funded the excavation.</p> <p>The site of the excavation is located north of the River Liffey in the historic parish of St.Michan's and the excavation, known as a 'rescue excavation', took place on a known 18th century urban cemetery. 469 articulated human remains and 134 disarticulated human remains were recorded.
