	Irish Archaeological Consultancy Ltd. provide a comprehensive range of archaeological and built heritage services to the development industry. Their clients include architects, planners, developers, local authorities, semi-state bodies and government departments.
	The archaeological excavation on this site took place in two phases from March to May 2001 and from February to April 2002. Preliminary site investigations by Mr. Martin Reid in 1999 in the North East corner of this site identified the remains of twenty articulated inhumations (Licence Ref: 97E094). Further testing was carried out in the South East corner which indicated that burials extended into this areas also and which prompted the excavation in question.
	The first phase of the excavation was concentrated in a 10m by 11 m area in the South East corner. The second phase concentrated on areas to the North and West of phase one. Rubble overburden on the site was removed by mechanical digger under strict archaeological supervision. All subsequent excavation on the site was carried out by hand. Prior to the excavation the site consisted of a car park. Following the excavation a five story office development with basement level car park was constructed.
	The site dates from the early medieval to the later medieval and post medieval period. The site is located in the parish of St. Peter in Royal Exchange Ward. It lies South East of the walls of the medieval town, in an area referred to in documents from the Anglo-Norman period as the 'Steine'. Close to the location of the excavation are the sites of the medieval churches of St. Stephen and St. Peter's.
