<b>Administrative/Biographical History</b>	<p>Arch-Tech Ltd. is an archaeological consultancy providing a full and comprehensive service including: assessment of planning conditions, impact studies, test-excavation, full-scale excavation, and post-excavation. They offer both archaeological planning and architectural conservation advice within one practice. The company was established in 1992 by archaeologist Leo Swan and conservation architect Timothy Foley.</p> <p>The archaeological excavation on this site began on 13 September 2004 and was completed on 7 December 2004. The excavation was undertaken in response to Condition No 16. of the Notification of Grant of Planning Permission from Dublin City Council (Planning Ref. 1730/03) dated 17 November 2005 and the subsequent recommendations by the City Archaeologist with Dublin City Council (dated 10 June 2004). The excavation was carried out on behalf of Sherborough Enterprises.</p> <p>The site is located on the corner of New Street and Fumbally Lane, Dublin 8. An Archaeological Assessment and Impact Statement for the site was carried out by Ms. Teresa Bolger, Margaret Gowan &amp; Co. before the excavation (report dated 09 June 2004).</p> <p>This excavation was situated on the western side of New Street and on the eastern side of the River Poddle. Five phases of activity were identified on the site. The first phase dated to the medieval period and reflected the site prior to its development. The second phase, later medieval, saw the establishment of extensive tanning activity. Tanning activities continued through the third and fourth phases, dating to the early and mid post-medieval periods respectively. The fifth phase, later post-medieval period, saw the transformation of the site area into residential and industrial buildings, gardens and laneways.</p>
