10 Historic sites on the Santry River

from Bronze Age to Victorian.





The River Santry has many historic associations, but little is known about it in any detail.

In early historic times, it was probably used to transport goods to and from the sea.

It certainly provided natural power for at least two watermills on its banks.

We know lakes were created on it at Edenmore House for fish ponds.










Objective of The Project

 - Improving social and recreational amenities in the catchment as identified through community/stakeholder engagement





• Conclusion: "...if current pressures were to be resolved, the Santry River would be capable of sustaining a healthy fish population and become a more valuable amenity."












